

RESOLUTION NO. 589

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSAL OF CERTAIN INVENTORY ITEMS DEEMED TO BE SURPLUS TO THE REASONABLY FORESEEABLE NEEDS OF THE CITY OF WOODLAND.


WHEREAS, certain items of equipment belonging to the City of Woodland are obsolete and no longer used by the City; and

WHEREAS, the value, obsolescence and condition of these items of inventory make it impractical to trade the same in on future purchases of new inventory items from the list of assets of the City, and to obtain the maximum return for said inventory items, it should be in the best interest of the City to dispose of the same in a manner that will be to the best advantage to the City of Woodland;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Woodland as follows:

1. Based upon the findings and recommendations of the City, the items of inventory belonging to said City as shown in Exhibit "A", attached hereto, are declared to be surplus to the foreseeable needs of the City.
2. That it is deemed to be for the common benefit of the residents of said City to dispose of said inventory.
3. That the Mayor is authorized to dispose of items listed in Exhibit "A", attached hereto, in a manner that will be to the best advantage to the City of Woodland.



- One (1) 1995 Ford Crown Victoria (VIN: 2FALP71W7SX178972)

- One (1) 1995 Chevrolet Caprice (VIN: 1G1BL52P4SR123315).

These two vehicles were removed from service earlier this year due to increased maintenance costs, decreased reliability, poor fuel economy, safety concerns, high mileage, and general vehicle conditions. Both vehicles were used for Fire Department service for several years after they had reached the end of their useful police service life. Members of the Department used these vehicles primarily for transportation to and from ongoing training activities.

The vehicles have been stripped of city markings, fire department equipment, and emergency warning equipment. If authorized, the Fire Department will seek maximum return on these assets through online sales using Craig's List or a similar service. When the sale has been completed, the vehicles will be removed from inventory and removed from our insurance coverage. The Fire Chief recommends authorization to dispose of these vehicles by means of an internet based sale.
